Hilary Brand looks at the power of the small choices we make on a daily basis and the role of faith in enabling or inhibiting choice. Many of us feel that our lives are very small. It is for others to make the big statements, the noble sacrifices, the grand gestures of faith. But within our humdrum lives lie a million small choices - any one of which could have huge consequences for ourselves, for those around us, and for the world.

She looks at what science and contemporary culture have to say about notions of freedom and responsibility, and the role of faith in enabling or inhibiting choice. She then applies this to the human scale, focusing on real life examples of people who have made a difference through the choices they have made.

Group sessions are structured around examination the two films which serve to highlight how choice can be exercised even in the most limited of circumstances.

The course provides weekly session which include video extracts, questions and further readings to help stimulate discussion

Many of the verses of Isaiah are familiar to us as beloved passages we read and sing each Christmas and Easter season.

But Isaiah is more than just a holiday reading. Isaiah speaks of God's relationship to the prophet, the people, the kings, and the servant. Isaiah's message invites us to explore God's personal character and develop a deeper understanding of the living God, the Holy One of Israel.

## **CHRISTIAN AID WEEK**

Thanks to the fact that we had eight volunteers (two more than last year) we managed to cover 80% of the area of Leyland (the Langdale Road estate) designated for us for the door to door collection for Christian Aid. The total that was collected and sent off to Christian Aid was £625 07, much the same as last year. We thank our collectors - Dianne and Greg Bolan, Alison Dempsey (with family help?), Brenda Holmes, Irene Entwistle, Liz Jenkins, Joanne Wrennall (assisted by Chris) and Ernest Wrennall for each of them visited every house on their designated areas certainly at least two and possibly three times - and front doors are set well back from the footpaths in areas like these.

As a collector one would wish that there was some sort of by-law to insist that houses with a double front door should have a door bell that worked or a good loud door knocker - and a letter box shield that did not trap the posties knuckles.

## ONE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED -AND COUNTING

Way back in the middle of the last century, when most churches had a thriving Youth structure, it was the custom in Congregational churches that the first Sunday in May each year would be classed as Young People's Day and the worship that day be left in the hands of the youngsters.

Leyland Congs. made this a real feature with choir stalls, lectern and pulpit duties being shared out among the volunteers. Because of commitments at University and National Service, the present writer had been able to escape such involvement but in 1957, with demobilisation approaching, pressure was placed on him. to take weekend leave and 'do the sermon'. So it was that on 5<sup>th</sup> May that year I preached my first ever 'sermon' on the unlikely text (for use of set lectionary was a foreign concept) "Moses knew not that the skin of his faith shone" (Exodus 34 v 29). **My sermon number one!**

When army duty ended I and others got involved in the Preston District Youth Preaching Team who filled in to lead worship wherever and whenever the District Preaching Plan Secretary had an empty pulpit to fill - and somehow seamlessly found myself being sent out as a fill in preacher as a one man band. So by the end of 1957 I had done 3 such services, with 7 in 1958 and 10 in 1957. By this time I had been added to the list of on call lay preachers and a member of the District Lay Preachers Fellowship and being booked to lead worship hither and thither.

I keep records and I averaged about 16 engagements per year in the 1960s and 70s and about 24 per year in the 1980s. As I became better known the number of invitations to lead worship increased to an average of 35 per year in the 1990s and 40 plus in the present century. In 2008 the highest score of 53 was reached.

In April 2002 I passed the 1000 mark with a special service at Leyland - and on 16<sup>th</sup> March 2014 I passed the next milestone as I led worship at Christ Church, Longridge-  
**my Sermon Number 1500.**

I can identify 63 different churches where I have preached with Longridge (132), Leyland (125) and Fulwood (107) being the top three though there have been well over 400 visits to churches on the Fylde coast. The total mileage involved in getting to and from these 1500 preaching engagements is 38,866 miles.

The furthest journeys have been to Kirkheaton Huddersfield, visits arranged when Bob and June Kay's daughter Elizabeth was the Pulpit Supply Secretary there. and the most difficult probably being a solitary visit to take an evening service at Kirkby Lonsdale Congregational Church all done by public transport in the days before I had a car.

Though I will go on leading worship whenever I can, I do not expect to reach any more milestones.

So if you have been wondering why I am missing from worship at Leyland so often over the years, now you know. I have 1500 alibis.

## CENTRAL LANCASHIRE TEAM MINISTRY

### An update on the current position

The creation of the proposed four church /two minister grouping involving Kirkham, Fulwood, Penwortham and Leyland URCS is now well beyond the proposal stage as representatives from the four churches have all reported that their church meetings have agreed for the go ahead and details of how things will be sorted out have been prepared. A great deal of careful planning has been carried out by the working party so ably chaired by Revd Paul Pells (who now steps down from that position) with Margery Pitcher from Fulwood as the very efficient Secretary.

Not only is there a properly constructed Constitution document but also a very finely detailed 'Memorandum of Understanding' paper which spells out exactly who does what in the new partnership.

Church profiles have been prepared - Neil Fow did ours largely based on the one we had when we were seeking a minister before Dave came -and a four church summary is prepared to explain to any interested minister seeking a change what the post would involve-including the rather confusing notion that 25% of the new person's time may be used in other pastorates as the Synod or Area Pastoral Committees see fit. Not our worry!

The vacancy will be (or perhaps already has been) advertised nationally to all ministers in normal fashion and if someone sees this as a challenge they would like to take on, profile details will be made available and face-to face meetings arranged by a future Vacancy Committee made up of Elders from all four churches.

In any future set up Dave would primarily remain as the Leyland and Penwortham minister with the new person concerned mainly with the life of Fulwood and Kirkham, and would be based in Fulwood. However Dave would need to be accepted by the Fulwood and Kirkham members just as the new person would need to be recognised as minister by the two south of the Ribble churches for each minister would preach occasionally in the other church.

One experiment being considered is to take stock of the worship leading resources in the group - two ministers, several active retired ministers, two Accredited Lay Preachers and three existing Worship Teams so that can perhaps be used by all four churches. Currently Margery Pitcher is seeing if some sort of internal Preaching Plan might be drawn up for the whole group so that individual Pulpit Supply Secretaries have to find outside leaders less often.

We are the one church without a regular internal Worship Group so Ernest would be interested to hear from any of our church family who would like to get involved in this sort of thing.

So now we wait to see if some minister somewhere is looking for pastures new and perhaps just happens to be a Preston North end Supporter.

Then things will start to happen.

# GARDENING

At the time of writing it is hot and sunny, the ground has dried out and everything is growing well. My pergola is covered in bloom from the wisteria and the golden hop is climbing up after it's winter rest and will soon be providing more shade as it travels across the top runner.

The rhododendrons are in flower and are due a massive prune along with other shrubs once the birds have finished nesting. One hundred sweet pea plants are climbing up a net and the delphiniums are in bud. The fuchsia plants in the greenhouse are beginning to get a little crowded but will soon have more room once I get all the bedding plants (grown from seed) planted, now that it is warmer at night.

The garden centres have a wider range of summer bedding plants which can be safely bought now and why not try a few summer bulbs. Lilies can look spectacular planted in small groups in the border but look out for lily beetles which are bright red in colour and can really spoil the foliage.

Look out for other pests such as aphids, these can be blasted off using a hosepipe, this is much safer than using chemical sprays. It is possible to use a garlic concentrate diluted with water, pests including slugs do not like the smell of it. Avant garden centre have promised to obtain it!
